

## The Poor Receiving Christ in a **School**

In the previous newsletter I introduced you to Sonela. As you recall, the two of us came close to being blown up by a bomb! Since that event 10 years ago Sonela was involved in a variety of ministries including six years as a chaplain and teacher in a Christian boarding school in the Indian state of Nagaland.

Our prayers for a good husband came true when she met and married Liba, a member of her own tribe, and now they have a one-year-old son. Together they are the proprietors of a private Christian school, grades one through 12.



Sonela's husband Liba started the school with two other people in 2002. Then in 2008 the other two dropped out and Liba took full charge of the school. Upon marrying Sonela they now work together in managing the school of 180 students. The new school year starts about the time you receive this newsletter, in February. At that time they expect over 200 students. Every year the school grows.

Holy King School is a ministry. As Sonela told me on the phone today, "Our purpose is to present the gospel."

Currently the school is working to develop its infrastructure. \$23,000 is still needed to complete all the construction. That is a huge sum for this poor area of India.

Yet even without the necessary infrastructure the school continues, in spite of


During the coming school year they expect over 200 students instead of the 180 they had last year. They plan to keep the nonpaying students down to 50.
